

Handicap Parking for the Disabled in Houston



The very first parking meter in the world was placed in Oklahoma City, Ok. in 1935 and from there spread out to cover all of our 50 states and other countries in the world. The enforcement of the parking time limit was the responsibility of the local police departments and citations/tickets were given to people who violated the time limit.

In 1967 the first Handicap Parking Only spaces were set up in Chicago, Ill. but these were spaces posted by local businesses as a courtesy for the wheelchair people and not enforced by the police. These spaces gave birth to states and cities establishing legal enforceable handicap spaces for any person, not just for wheelchairs, with a permit. These permits could either be a state-issued special license plate or a placard that hung on the rearview mirror or placed on the dash of the vehicle. At first, the local police would enforce the privilege of using these handicap spaces. However, over time, there became so many spaces at all the different businesses and offices within the city that the police department needed volunteers to help enforce the law.

An Enforcement Officer will verify that these permits are displayed on the vehicle and are valid. After taking an accredited class, I have been an Enforcement Officer for 18 months. Should a vehicle not have a permit or be seen using an expired permit,

a citation for the amount of \$500 is written and placed on the vehicle. Since I became an Enforcement Officer I have written over 5000 citations. However, not every citation results in a \$500 fine. There are various reasons why the citation would be dismissed; one would be that the driver has a placard but it is out of sight. A special officer will listen to the reason for a request for dismissal of the citation and make that decision. However, over 80% of the citations are found to be valid and the fine has to be paid.

Should a Deaf person have a handicap permit? In my opinion, if the person is Deaf only, the answer is 'no'. But the Deaf are just as likely to have another disability that prevents them from walking far and have a need to park up close. Therefore, we must be reasonable to say that only those people, Deaf or hearing, which have a health situation that requires the person to use a handicap space, have the legal courtesy of using those spaces.

Since I have become an Enforcement Officer, I have seen many violations by individuals who disregard the law and prevent the handicapped from having the spaces. Often times, while I'm doing enforcement, a driver will stop to speak with me about having no parking space because the spaces are taken by illegally parked vehicles. I feel a tug on my heart for them but there is nothing I can do but to inform these handicapped persons that they will have to look for another available space.

Please be a kind and considerate driver and park and walk a little bit farther and leave the handicap spaces open for those who have a real need for the space. Walking 20 - 50 more feet is much better than a \$500 kick in your back pocket.



April Fool's Day Brief History



In sixteenth-century France, the start of the new year was observed on April first. It was celebrated in much the same way as it is today with parties and dancing into the late hours of the night. Then in 1562, Pope

Gregory introduced a new calendar for the Christian world, and the new year fell on January first. There were some people, however, who hadn't heard or didn't believe the change in the date, so they continued to celebrate New Year's Day on April first. Others played tricks on them and called them "April fools." They sent them on a "fool's errand" or tried to make them believe that something false was true. In France today, April first is called "Poisson d'Avril." French children fool their friends by taping a paper fish to their friends' backs. When the "young fool" discovers this trick, the prankster yells "Poisson d'Avril!" (April Fish!). In Spain this is called "Dia de los Inocentes" and it is celebrated on Decembre the 28th.



A flock of geese!" and point up. School children might tell a classmate that school has been canceled. Whatever the trick, if the innocent victim falls for the joke the prankster yells, "April Fool! "

The "fools' errands" we play on people are practical jokes. Putting salt in the sugar bowl for the next person is not a nice trick to play on a stranger. College students set their clocks an hour behind, so their roommates show up to the wrong class - or not at all. Some practical jokes are kept up the whole day before the victim realizes what day it is. Most April Fool jokes are in good fun and not meant to harm anyone. The most clever April Fool joke is the one where everyone laughs, especially the person upon whom the joke is played.
